


The Younger Women's Task Force (YWTF) is a section of AAUW devoted to women in their 20s and 30s. YWTF was first started in 2004, when Alison Stein noticed that she and her peers were aging out of college and youth-based women's groups but weren't quite clicking with the established women's movement and the organizations representing it. Stein went to her boss who happened to be the chair of the National Council of Women's Organizations (NCWO) for help organizing.

Within weeks, a network with women from around the country developed and called themselves the National Coordinating Committee for the Younger Women's Task Force. The next year, the committee held a summit for young women from 42 different states where delegates drafted an agenda and established chapters across the country.

In 2013, YWTF joined AAUW's network of organizations. YWTF offers younger women an important space to connect with the women's movement and social justice causes in ways that fit their busy lives and schedules. In New York City, we are relaunching YWTF NYC this winter. YWTF NYC was first established in 2005 and by 2011, it had over 500 members.

YWTF NYC is a diverse and inclusive network of activists, organizers, allies, and professionals that works together to fight for social justice and greater equity for all people, within the 5 boroughs and beyond. YWTF shares a lot of common interests and concerns with AAUW. In New York City, we are specifically focusing on student loan debt, pay equity, and ending gender-based violence this year.

7 Facts You Didn't Know about Eleanor Roosevelt and AAUW



October 31, 2014

We're bragging here, but sometimes our history is just too good not to share. AAUW is proud to have called supporter, and friend. It is of course

Eleanor Roosevelt a member, supporter, and friend. It is of course impossible to list all of the ways the famous first lady connected with us over the years, so here are some of the highlights.

1. She joined AAUW in 1929.

As a young girl, Eleanor Roosevelt was educated privately, and her only formal education ended in 1902 when she left London's Allenswood Academy as a teenager. She did not attend college. However, AAUW membership was still open to her: The criteria had a special ruling that stated that membership was open to

women who had received honorary degrees from a list of approved colleges.

In her lifetime, Eleanor Roosevelt received 45 honorary degrees, the first of which came from Russell Sage College in Troy, New York, in 1929, when she was New York's first lady. This was the college's first honorary degree. At a speech granting her the degree, the college president called her "one of the ablest, most energetic, and most versatile women in public life today."

2. Her first speech to an AAUW audience was in 1929.

At an event marking Armistice Day in 1929, Roosevelt addressed an AAUW audience for the first time. She spoke to

the AAUW New York City (NY) Branch. Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, as she was introduced, was also the guest of honor at the branch dinner, and according to the *New York Times*, "ha[d] just been elected to the membership in the AAUW."

In her address, Roosevelt urged the members to do everything possible to make "another war impossible." She continued, "The only real safeguard is what education can do to change the hearts of men, and I think that has to be done by women. I think that you are the women to do it."

3. She attended AAUW branch meetings throughout the

4. Her close friend was an AAUW leader in New York.

Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt built Val-Kill cottage in Hyde Park, New York, near the Roosevelt family home. Eleanor lived there along with her friends Marion Dicker-

manand Nancy Cook. The three women also operated a business called Val-Kill Industries that employed local residents in furniture-making and handicrafts. Marion Dickerman was president of both the AAUW New York City (NY) Branch and AAUW of New York State. She was active in state politics with the Democratic Party, serving as executive secretary of the women's division of the State Democratic Committee. In addition to being a political activist, Dickerman was also an educator; she served as vice president and principal of the Todhunter School, a private school where Roosevelt also taught.

5. She believed that women were written out of history.

Image courtesy of the National Archives and Records Administration As first lady, Roosevelt held White House press conferences exclusively for women reporters because they were usually barred from the president's press conferences. In 1936, she invited Mary Ritter Beard, a historian and AAUW member, to speak about her efforts to write women back into history. This was on the same day that Beard saw her dream take

shape — the World Center for Women's Archives, a grand idea to collect and centralize the archival records of women's contributions to our world, held its first planning meeting.

Later that evening, Roosevelt and Beard visited AAUW's headquarters at 1634 Eye St. in Washington, D.C., and along with AAUW leaders they discussed the plan to gather historical materials relating to women. Roosevelt expressed surprise that women had not "tackled the writing of history in larger numbers than seemingly they have done" but applauded Beard's efforts to gather the documents necessary to do so. Both women expressed dismay that major U.S. history books at that time failed to mention a single woman.

6. She spoke at the AAUW National Convention in 1959 on the United States as a Democratic Leader.

In her remarks to the convention audience in Kansas City, Roosevelt addressed the subject of the United States' position in the world during the Cold War era. She answered the question of why Americans should help developing areas of the world. According to Roosevelt, as leaders of the noncommunist world, Americans must understand the regions that have yet to be swayed to either democracy or communism. Americans needed a complete understanding of the native people, customs, and religions in order to better understand what democracy could offer to those nations.

7. Eleanor Roosevelt and AAUW were a natural fit from the start!



December 14, 1961: President Kennedy establishes the Presidential Commission on the Status of Women to investigate the social and economic conditions of women in America. He appoints Eleanor Roosevelt as chair of the commission.

Visible in the photograph are AAUW members Rep. Edith Green (D-OR) and Marguerite Rawalt.

Eleanor Roosevelt had so much in common with AAUW. We both sought to find safe haven for refugee scholars during World War II, we both urged political leaders to appoint women to public office (and rejoiced over the appointment of AAUW memberFrances Perkins as Franklin Roosevelt's Secretary of Labor). We were both also involved with the establishment of the United Nations and with John F. Kennedy'sPresident's Commission on the Status of Women. And this is just the tip of the iceberg.

Thanks for the fond memories, Eleanor; you continue to inspire us!

A conversation with Lisa Maatz AAUW VP Government Relations.

ESVB members and other AAUW friends had the opportunity to speak with Lisa Maatz, AAUW Vice President of Government Relations, at the Harvard Club in NYC recently. Over a delicious luncheon Lisa told us about her effective staff of nine, each of whom has a unique role in influencing legislation.

It was fascinating to hear about all the maneuvering, strategizing, working with political forces and more that resulted in the eventual passage, with significant additions, of the Reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). It was wonderful to realize that AAUW was a vital force and prime mover behind the successful campaign to have VAWA bills passed in the Senate and the House that eventually became the law of the land. Lisa sprinkled her discussion with the names of Senators, Representatives, lobbyist and others of influence with whom she was quite familiar.

Lisa told us she worked for passage of the first VAWA 20 years ago and each Reauthorization since then. The new VAWA incorporates the SaVE Act, which we lobbied on the Hill for at the last AAUW Convention in Washington. It address sexual assault on campus by requiring schools to make their campus disciplinary processes more transparent, to train and educate students as well as faculty and staff, and to update sexual assault policies. It also calls for gathering new statistics, starting this year, about domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. Lisa detailed for us the difficulties and triumphs in obtaining support in Congress for the inclusion of protection for Native Americans; lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals; and immigrants. This was an uphill battle that was won.

We can be very proud of our AAUW's advocacy both in Washington and at your computer with the Two Minute Activist (http://www.aauw.org/what-we-do/public-policy/two-minuteactivist/). AAUW also needs our financial support to successfully advocate, so consider sending a check to the AAUW Public Policy Fund or the AAUW Action Fund today!

During the Fall Season we have an opportunity to integrate cultural celebrations in our branch activities.

Starting in September, there are cultural celebrations of beginnings– both spiritual and secular.

Ganesh Chaturthi is a Hindu festival celebrated for ten(10) days marking the birthday of Lord Ganesh, the patron saint of arts and sciences and the deity of intellect and wisdom.

The mid-autumn festival, also called Moon festival, is one of the most important dates in the Chinese New Year. Traditionally, Chinese family members and friends will gather to admire the harvest moon and eat moon cakes. Eating moon cakes during this time is still observed in many part of the U.S.

The Jewish people celebrate important holidays in September: Rosh Hashanah and Yum Kippur. Rosh Hashanah remembers the creation of the world. It is a time for personal introspection and prayer and part of the process of spiritual growth. Yum Kippur, also known as Day of Atonement, is the holiest day of the year for the Jewish people. Its central themes are atonement and repentance.

Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, a special time for over one billion Muslims throughout the world for fasting, inner reflection, devotion to God, charity giving and self accountability.

Diwali, the festival of lights, was celebrated this year on October 23rd throughout India, Nepal and Bhutan. It symbolizes that age-old culture of India that teaches humanity to drive away darkness that engulfs the light of knowledge. The strength of women is celebrated during this festival.

During the month of November we celebrate the Day of the Dead (El Dia de los Muertos).

From pre Columbian times, El Día de los Muertos, the Day of the Dead, has been celebrated in Mexico and other Latin countries and in the Philippines. This is a very special ritual, since it is the day when the living remember their departed relatives. The Day of the Dead is a beautiful ritual in which Mexicans and people from countries with Spanish heritage happily and lovingly remember their loved relatives who have died– Much like when we go to a graveyard to leave some lovely flowers on a tomb of a relative.
